PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



At the meeting on 2^{nd} November there were no issues raised from the public during the open forum.

Two nominations had been received regarding the vacancies on the Council. After being introduced to the PC both Peter Coates from Broomhaugh and Mark Davis from Stable Close were elected.

Our County Councillor, David Towns, had arranged a meeting at County

Hall to discuss the issues which had been raised at the last meeting regarding Longhirst Hall and Micklewood Close. Members of the Parish Council, residents from Micklewood and representatives from the Planning Department were present. As yet no response has been forthcoming from the discussions.

The PC re-affirmed its commitment regarding support for further plants/flowers etc. to enhance the Village. Very large pots would be needed. Any suggestions from Parishioners would be very welcome.

It was agreed by all that the **precept** should be raised to £4,000. There are plans to repair the seat on the Church corner and erect a new notice board on Ulgham Lane. If residents have any other ideas or concerns please contact the Clerk (a) or any Councillor.

The planning application for 3 houses at Longhirst Station is still to be decided. An application to demolish the old wooden stables at the Dairy and replace them with a stone structure has been received. Councillors indicated that they had no objection.

Concerns regarding traffic speed within the Parish, but particularly through the Village, were again raised. After discussion the Clerk was asked to inquire about flashing speed signs and the idea of a 20mph zone. Two new street lights have been suggested for the outskirts of the Village on the Pegswood Road and Station Road. The Clerk will discuss this with NCC Highways Department.

The Village website needs a co-ordinator, if you are interested in helping please contact the Clerk (a).

The next meeting will be on Thursday 4th January at 7pm in the Village Hall. All residents are encouraged to attend.

CHRISTMAS FUND RAISING

We like to support local charities with the money we collect from Carol singing, at our Christmas Lunch and at the Family Carol Service.

Jill McManus and Andy Foreman, from the Village, are volunteers with 'Wellbeing Challenge' which works mainly with families from deprived areas in South Tyneside and it has been suggested that we may like to donate to them this year. Jill says:

'Our projects aim to give families the skills and confidence to go on to make positive changes in their own lives.

Each of our projects works with a group of about ten families over a period of about a year. The project starts with teaching resilience skills to the parents who then work with us to teach these skills to their own children. We take the families on a Residential at an outdoor centre which gives them a chance to put their resilience skills into practice while taking part in challenging physical activities. This is a key part of our work as it enables every family member to be recognised for their positive contributions and it helps build confidence and shared family memories of their experiences. We follow this up by continuing to work with the parents on individual and family challenges which support them in engaging with activities in their own local communities.

'This is an innovative approach to working with families which we are continuing to develop as many of our previous course participants tell us the project has made a big difference to their lives. Wellbeing Challenge is a small community interest company and most of our funding comes from grants (e.g. from Big Lottery & European Social Fund). We are currently running a Wellbeing Challenge course for unemployed adults and are in the process of applying for grants and fundraising for our next family project'.


TRAIDCRAFT

VICAR'S LETTER



"While shepherds watched their flocks by night all seated on the ground the angel of the Lord came down and glory shone around.

'Fear not,' said he for mighty dread had seized their troubled minds ..."

... the opening lines of the popular Christmas carol celebrating the visit of the shepherds to the stable at Bethlehem. As with many sacred places in the Holy Land a chapel was built on the spot identified as the place where the shepherds were looking after their flock in the fields around Bethlehem on that first Christmas

Eve. I have not visited the chapel myself, I was made aware of it first through BBC Thought for the Day and then the internet of course is a wonderful thing. The chapel contains three paintings recalling the events: one showing the angel telling the shepherds about the birth; the second has them in the familiar nativity scene at the stable and in the third they are returning to the fields. In each case a dog has been added to the scene. No dog is mentioned in the Gospel story but such is artistic licence. In the first painting the dog is depicted in a state of holy terror at the sight of the angel. In the second it has calmed down and is a very attentive witness to the nativity. In the third it is bouncing along, tail wagging and you can almost hear it barking. The artist, it seems, has added the dog as a symbol of fear giving way to faith.

I don't think a Christmas has gone by without some sense of unease setting in as it draws near about what has been left undone and what there is still to do. This is especially so when late cards arrive from people you've not sent one to or a young member of the family expresses a heartfelt Christmas wish with less than two days to go. In my case it is more likely that ideas for the Christmas sermon just aren't surfacing and I have to remind myself that it really is the most wonderful time of the year. But that sense of panic soon disappears when I hear of real troubles and tragedies going on from around the world and from which it seems there is to be no Christmas holiday. Indeed you may recall that last year in Berlin it was at a Christmas market, among people making their own Christmas preparations, that terror struck. That's what makes the words heard by the shepherds in the fields around Bethlehem so precious, "Fear not ..."

In the Christmas story too there are good reasons for the central characters to be fearful. A young couple making a long journey far from home with the woman heavily pregnant in a land ruled by a crazy dictator like King Herod. (Herod has his modern equivalents). Moreover Jesus was to be born in a country under military occupation, a risky birth in a dangerous place. Therefore the good news in the Christmas story is about God coming to live among us in our troubles and in the midst of our fears, not arriving when all is safe and all is well. Christians believe that God is with us when the chips are well and truly down as well as in the joys of life.

After their visit to the infant Jesus the shepherds and the dog return to the fields, back to normality with all its difficulties, just as before. However they do so now with renewed joy and hope in their hearts. Their response to the angelic message to visit the manger and contemplate, even for a few short minutes, the child in the straw, made the difference. How many of us, I wonder, need to hear and accept the same divine invitation, "Fear not, for behold I bring you good tidings of great joy ... for unto you is born this day in the city of David a saviour, who is Christ the Lord."
