LONGHIRST WILDLIFE & COMMUNITY TRUST FREE EVENTS



Friday 26 April, 11.00-14.00, Spring Wildlife Walk at Scotch Gill Woods, Morpeth (meeting at Morpeth Rugby Club). An opportunity to explore plants and other spring wildlife in an ancient woodland along with Mark Welfare from the Natural History Society of Northumbria.

Saturday, 4 May, 10.00-12.30, Bird ID for Beginners at Gosforth Nature Reserve. A guided walk around the reserve listening to and spotting the abundant birdlife at this time of year. Open to all, NOT just beginners!

Sunday, 26 May, 18.00-20.00, Evening Chorus. A nature walk around Woodruff Wood (on Ulgham Lane) with the owners to listen to the bird calls at dusk.

It may not feel like Spring yet but it's the time of year when birds are beginning to build their nests and hedgehogs are starting to think about coming out of hibernation. The Longhirst Wildlife and Community Trust has bought a multi-purpose steam cleaner which you are welcome to borrow to clean out your bird feeders, nesting boxes and hedgehog houses. Just contact Pauline if you'd like to borrow it. You can also clean and disinfect your feeders and nest boxes with Virkon S disinfectant, which is highly effective yet safe to use around pets (and easy to buy over the internet).



PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



At the Parish Council meeting held on 7 March two residents raised the following concerns:-

Speeding through the Village: It was explained that this is an ongoing problem and that all current options have been considered. The chicane had been installed at the north end and flashing speed warning signs both north and south. Speed bumps would cause disturbance for adjacent residents, especially at night. The police have been requested to carry out speed checks.

Gully cleaning and fly-tipping: It was explained that the County Council had reduced the frequency of their gully maintenance schedule because of spending cuts and, as a consequence, all residents should promptly report any problems directly to NCC using the FixMyStreet system. Any instances of fly-tipping should also be reported this way. The County has acted on many previous reports.

Longhirst Colliery

Bill Climson has recently reported to NCC that human waste had been left at the Longhirst Colliery bus shelter. He also reported tyres having been dumped near Potland Park, and the numerous potholes near Longhirst Colliery. In addition, he mentioned that wagons were arriving before North East Grains (NEG) opened and waiting at the Colliery bus shelter. It was suggested that full details of the lorries or photographs are taken by residents and to report to NEG.

Julie Murray asked if it would be possible to reduce the speed limit on the road from Longhirst Colliery because of the deer which cross that road. She also mentioned the overgrown hedges on the same stretch of road and the mud-covered footpaths caused by lorries and tractors creating ruts and depositing mud. Colleen Anderson commented that the same applied to Ulgham Lane.

Longhirst Hall

Andy Robson raised an issue that the deeds of the flats at Longhirst Hall may include some liability for Church repairs. It was suggested that the residents take advice from their solicitors.

The Forge Ulgham

The Community Management Committee has made a formal purchase offer to the owner of The Forge and at this stage it has been rejected. Despite this they are going to continue their efforts.

Butterwell Site Liaison Group

N B Clark would prefer to wait until the site is operational before constituting a liaison group. Concerns over lorries being routed from Coney Garth or through the Village were raised with the Company and it would seem that the correct route from the east is now being adhered to.

Public Footpath

A resident previously raised the need for a public footpath to the north of the Village towards Broomhaugh. He has agreed to research the history of a former track running south from Broomhaugh.

Morpeth Caravan Park

The application for a change of use for 4 holiday cottages has been rejected by NCC.

Budget Items

- Ashington Road flooding NCC has apparently agreed to undertake the drainage repairs so the proposed Parish Council contribution may be used towards the cost of raising of the road.
- **Community Skips** to be used by residents who cannot get to the recycling centre. Richard Tordoff agreed to have the skip placed on his driveway (see page 3 for further details).
- Area around the War Memorial Chris Marr was thanked for his work in tidying the area opposite the memorial. Purchase of additional seating is being investigated together with the fitting of a water supply to aid the maintenance of the flower tubs.

- Longhirst Hall Community Event Andy Robson reported a lack of interest by Longhirst Hall residents to celebrate the bicentenary of the Hall, so this is not going ahead.
- **Paddock (Millennium)Wood path improvements** a meeting is being held with Groundwork NE to prepare a detailed plan and costings.
- Village Hall projector and screen more information and costs are being researched.

Overhanging trees near the Church bus stop – Richard Tordoff was thanked for clearing some of the overhanging branches and NCC has subsequently carried out further clearance work. NCC will also install three bollards to protect the new lychgate and to improve the area in front of the Church.

Voter ID requirements – Identification is now required in order to vote at a polling station. Reminders of this will be placed on noticeboards and on the Parish Council website (see below for further details). Next Meeting – the Annual General Meetings will take place at **7pm on Thursday 2 May** at Longhirst Colliery Recreation Hall (please note the change of venue because of the mayoral election). All residents are welcome to come along and join us. Colleen Anderson

SKIP IN VILLAGE

As part of a Parish Council initiative, there will be a skip placed in the Village for the benefit of residents. The idea behind this has come from Pegswood who offer this facility to assist in the clearing of rubbish that blights the appearance of their Village. Although we do not seem to have the same problem, we have a lot of elderly people who may benefit from a little in-house clearance, possibly with the help of neighbours.

With this in mind we intend to rent a skip that will be placed in the drive of The Farmhouse in the centre of the Village. This is to prevent unauthorized use and to take it off the road. The date is to be confirmed and it will be there for a limited time.

Items that can be discarded ideally should be within the spirit of its original concept. If you normally go to the tip with waste then please continue to do so, therefore allowing more space for those who cannot get there. No tyres, oil, white goods, asbestos etc. please. Otherwise there are no limits as long as the object fits into the skip.

ST. JOHN'S LYCHGATE RESTORED AT LAST

Everyone is invited to the official dedication of the rebuilt lychgate. The archdeacon of Lindisfarne will perform a short ceremony on **Sunday 5 May at 11am**. There will be light refreshments in the Church after the event to which all are welcome. The rebuilding has taken far longer than anticipated but the final result is magnificent. A lychgate is commonly the principal gateway to a churchyard, separating consecrated and un-consecrated ground and traditionally was the place where coffin-bearers would shelter prior to a burial. The gate at St. John's is particularly impressive with a high-pitched roof covered with clay tiles. It was originally erected in 1885 and was wrecked in June 2021 when a pick-up truck failed to take the bend and hit the gate head on, demolishing the superstructure and the stone supporting pillars.

Since then it has been a long and frustrating two and a half year wait for the lychgate to be repaired. As much of the original stone and

timber as possible was retained and reconstruction eventually commenced in July 2023, with the masonry work being completed first. There was then a two-month delay while the joiner sourced timber that matched the original. The roof tiles then had to be hand-made at a kiln in the south of England and just to add to the delays the vehicle carrying the tiles to Longhirst was involved in a collision on the M1. The tiles were scattered all over the carriageway and replacements had to be made. Work was finally completed on 13 December 2023.

With assistance from Northumberland County Council Highways and local County Councillor David Towns, bollards should soon be installed which we hope will protect the lychgate from future damage. The area in front of the gate will also be resurfaced and the step removed.

VILLAGE HALL NEWS



At our March Board of Trustees meeting, we were pleased to hear that the Lottery funded fresh air ventilation system has been commissioned and is working fairly well, but there remain one or two issues that still need to be put right and plans are in hand to accomplish these. The board approved, in principle, a new safeguarding policy for children and vulnerable adults which will be confirmed at the next meeting.

Initial estimates for the cost of resurfacing the rear car park came in well above the amount that the Parish Association can currently afford. Nevertheless, the board recognised that there is a need to solve this problem before next winter and they resolved to find a way to do so.

The board received a report that confirmed we could install a video projector and screen within the budget offered by the Parish Council and, subject to agreement on the location of the screen and projector and to the obtaining of another estimate, it was agreed that this will go ahead.
