## PARISH COUNCIL REPORT



At the Council Meeting held on the 3 March:

### **Longhirst Colliery Woodland Clearance**

Two residents attended the meeting and raised a concern that the County Council is going to clear fell the woodland at the back of Longhirst Colliery. This woodland suffered serious damage during the recent storms and a number of trees have fallen down. County

Councillor David Towns has since confirmed that, following instructions from Network Rail, the intention is to clear a 25m buffer strip next to the railway and to remove the fallen and any dangerous trees. There are no plans to clear fell the wood.

Following questions about the focus of the Parish Council, Peter Coates confirmed that the Council represents the whole of the Parish and all residents are invited to attend the bi-monthly meetings.

### **Highways Issues**

Ashington Road Peter Coates reported that some ditch clearance has been done and this should keep the road passable for now but more work will be needed before next winter.

Station Road Part of Station Road and the footway alongside have been resurfaced and there are new road markings at the cross-roads. Peter Coates thanked the County Council for doing an excellent job. Some residents had raised concerns about the lack of kerb facings but the Parish Council accepts that this would be a costly task to undertake. Unfortunately the County Council's budget of £90,000 only covered the cost of resurfacing to just past North East Grains. An extension to the footpath beyond the Colliery to the railway has been requested by the Parish Council but budget constraints mean this is unlikely to happen in the near future.

### **Jubilee Activities / Funding (tree and plaque)**

To celebrate the Queen's Jubilee the planting of a commemorative tree marked with a plaque from the Royal British Legion was agreed in principle. The type of tree and where to plant it is being considered.

### **Request from a resident for a litter bin at Longhirst Colliery bus shelter**

A resident has written in to request the reinstatement of a litter bin at the bus shelter at Longhirst Colliery. When the shelter was active there was a bin there, but it has since been removed or fallen off. The resident complained of rubbish and human waste being left inside the shelter. The question is whether a bin is the right answer if the problem is not actually litter. Glen Fahy will look into this.

### **Planning Issues**

Confirmation has been sought from NCC that the "hole in the wall" allowing access for construction works from Longhirst Hall to the new dwellings north of Dairy Lane is only temporary. This has now been received.

NCC's decision for the planning application for 5 new homes in Domino's Field was expected shortly. This has now been received and the application has been firmly refused.

Residents of Micklewood Close have been asked to provide a copy of one set of deeds that state that they will be given pedestrian access onto Dairy Lane. This issue can then be taken forward with the Planning Dept.

### **Review of the Strategic Parish Plan**

There was a lengthy discussion on the review of the Strategic Parish Plan which identifies key areas for action by the Parish Council and records progress. Chris Marr led an activity to review

the plan with a view to updating it and making it more relevant to current needs. The discussion is ongoing.

### **Parish Groups Meeting**

Representatives from the Parish Council, Longhirst Parish Association, Longhirst Show Association, Parochial Church Council, Open Gardens, Wildlife and Community Group and the Longhirst Leader met to discuss a variety of issues.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee Picnic The Groups agreed to propose that a Community Picnic is held in the Millennium / Paddock Wood starting at 12 noon on Saturday 4 June with residents invited to bring along their own tables, chairs, blankets, food and drink. It is intended to be quite informal. Arrangements will be made to have the grass cut and to hire a portalo. Transport will also be arranged for anyone who needs it (such as those with mobility problems).

Storm Arwen The Village Hall proved to be an essential resource during and after the storms providing heat, water, cooking facilities, electricity and wifi. The importance of maintaining power supplies at the Hall was recognised and the Parish Association had already submitted a bid for the installation of solar panels and batteries. Funds for a back up generator will also be sought.

The Parish Council has agreed to donate £1,000 per year for the next three years. This would be used by the Village Hall to meet additional emergency running costs.

Covid Pandemic The Parish had fared better than most with local informal social networks providing assistance where necessary. The efforts of all the volunteers to help with shopping etc. were much appreciated.

Open Gardens Weekend Preparations are well under way and a number of gardens have already been offered for the event.

Wildlife and Community Group A Longhirst Wildlife and Community Trust is to be created and a bid for Natural Heritage Lottery funding has been submitted. The Parish Council agreed to donate £100 per year to the Trust to help with running costs.

Church Lychgate The decision on how to proceed with the repairs lies with the Ecclesiastical Authorities and this is proving to be slow.

## VILLAGE HALL NEWS



We have good news to report in this issue of the Longhirst Leader. At long last, the refurbishment of the Library at the Village Hall is complete; the books are back on the shelves and available to borrow as are the jigsaws. We also have dark and dry cupboards to store the historical records collected by Ian Thompson and Gill Featonby and Peter McKenzie has agreed to create a series of displays of these records on a board put up for the purpose.

The other bit of good news is that we have been awarded a Lottery Grant of just over £65K to install solar panels on the south facing Elphick Room roof together with battery packs to provide most of our electricity, to refurbish the Reading Room and to install a fresh air ventilation system for both the Elphick Room and the Reading Room. The money will become available from April this year and needs to be spent before the end of March 2023. It's going to be a busy year.

## LONGHIRST VILLAGE SHOW



The Longhirst Village Show has been a well-established tradition in our Village calendar since it was first introduced in 1915. Lots of Villagers have taken part over the years, competing to see who has grown the best fruit, vegetables or flowers, as well as competing in the baking, crafts and photograph sections of the Show and helping to run the event every year.

Other parts of the annual Show which people have always seemed to enjoy have been the raffle, tombola, auction and, of course, the teas.

Over the 107 years since the Show first began the number of entrants in various classes has steadily declined as people move on and interests change with the times. The Village Show Committee have recently decided to look at doing something different in the future rather than continue with the Show in its traditional form. We are keen to try to preserve and possibly develop the successful aspects and to keep that sense of community that was a key part of it.

These are some of the ideas so far .....

- We could attach the most popular aspects/ parts of the Village Show to other regular or annual events in the Village such as the Village Coffee Mornings, creating 'themed events' (e.g. a photography exhibition or display of flowers / vegetables)
- We could create a brand-new annual event in place of the Village Show
- We could disband the Village Show altogether in light of other popular Village events that are in place and already foster a community spirit

We would like to involve people who live in the Parish before any final decisions are made. It would be enormously helpful to know which parts of the Village Show have been the most enjoyable and valuable to YOU over the years. We would also like to invite your ideas and suggestions and we will discuss these before deciding on the best way forward.



## VICAR'S LETTER



This is the first time I have contributed an article to the Longhirst Leader hoping that by the time this short piece is published it will have become out of date. We are all aware of the terrible situation that has been unfolding in Ukraine in recent weeks through the extensive media coverage it has received. Apart from all those who are suffering directly from the war, be they combatants, Ukraine civilians who are staying put or those who are seeking refuge in neighbouring countries, it must also be a terribly anxious time for

Ukraine citizens resident in the UK and other countries wondering how their families back home are coping. There may also be Russian citizens in the UK who are wondering why their government has created this appalling situation, who worry about what happens next, especially if they themselves have relatives in the Russian armed forces or have relatives who have been bravely taking to the streets to protest against the war at great risk to themselves. As I say, I hope that by the time you are reading this, the war will have stopped, peace will have broken out and both sides will have agreed a just settlement. As I write, however, that remains a slender hope rather than an expectation. I would not be surprised if many of us have been responding generously, in one way or another, to the appeals from those charitable organisations which are seeking to support the huge numbers of refugees currently streaming out of Ukraine. Nevertheless, in the face of such a huge catastrophe like this there may seem to be so little else we can offer other than our concern and our hopes for peace. However we can also pray. In our church services and other meetings we have been saying the following prayer given to us by our church leaders, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York. Please use it as you think best.

*"God of peace and justice, we pray for the people of Ukraine today. We pray for peace and the laying down of weapons. We pray for all those who fear for tomorrow, that your Spirit of comfort would draw near to them. We pray for those who have power over war or peace, for wisdom, discernment and compassion to guide their decisions. Above all we pray for all your precious children, at risk and in fear, that you would hold and protect them. We pray in the name of Jesus, the Prince of Peace. Amen."*
