BEAVERING AWAY... by Pauline Gilbertson of the Longhirst Wildlife & Community Trust

When I think of beavers (which, admittedly, isn't often) I think of industrious creatures who, before we hunted them to extinction, shaped our countryside by building dams. Until recently I didn't appreciate that their work encouraged biodiversity, discouraged flooding and increased fish populations by keeping the waterways clean. Any fan of *The Archers* (in which the proposed reintroduction of beavers to Ambridge is currently a hot topic) will be aware that opinions are strongly divided; for every beaver protagonist there is a vociferous dissenter. Beavers, hunted for their pelts and meat, became extinct in the UK in the 16th century and across most of Europe two hundred years later. It's only in recent years that beavers have been reintroduced to the UK, first in Kent in 2001 and followed by other reintroductions at various sites from Devon to Scotland.

In 2023 it was time for beavers to return to Northumberland with four animals being reintroduce in a large enclosure at the National Trust's Wallington Hall estate.



Most of us (me included) know very little about these fascinating and controversial creatures, which is why the Longhirst Wildlife and Community Trust has arranged an illustrated talk about them on Saturday morning, 8th February. Heather Devey, who you might have seen with her partner Cain on BBC2's *Our Dream Farm* last year, will be our speaker. She and Cain run Wild Intrigue, the company which manages the Beaver Safari events at Wallington.

Do join us if you can — it will be fascinating - and you might also like to combine our talk with the village coffee morning immediately beforehand — a double reason to visit the Village Hall on Saturday 8th February!

OBITUARIES

Jean Humble

Jean Humble of Kyloe House died on 24th December after a long illness. Jean had been involved with the community since the early days, arranging many events including a Christmas lunch one year for 55 people of the colliery. She was always very kind and contributed to the Colliery Hall events. Jean began her working life as a nurse then later went into the police force. In retirement, she loved nothing better than to sit outside and talk to anyone passing and tell stories of her past.

Jean leaves her husband George; they had been married 52 years. Jean will be sadly missed by all who knew her.

Bill Wake 19 October 1925 – 9 December 2024

Bill Wake was an only child; his widowed mother worked to support them both, and his early years were spent at Callerton, where she was house-keeper to the Fenwick family. He started work aged 14, as a chemist's message boy.



In 1943 he joined the Navy and trained as a sickberth attendant. On the eve of D-Day he was assigned to a tank landing ship which took troops and tanks to Normandy and brought home the wounded. For this role he was later awarded the Legion d'Honneur, of which he was immensely proud. Naval service then took him to Australia, where he met Nerida. After the War they corresponded for years before she joined him in England. They married in 1952 and set up home in Ashington, where their daughters Helen and Yvonne were born.

By this time Bill was a qualified pharmacist, and in 1961 he bought the pharmacy in Red Row, where he served the community devotedly until his retirement. In 1971 Bill and Nerida moved to Ulgham and became regular attenders at St. John's church, Longhirst. Their many friends among the congregation supported Bill through Nerida's long illness, and after her death in 2001, and he continued his regular visits to church and village events.

He was gentle, kind and even-tempered but also determined and resilient, and his standards were always high. The onset of dementia did not affect his unfailing courtesy, or his meticulous care of his appearance. He continued to live independently until his move to a care home only six months before his death at the age of 99.

Bill regularly attended the lunches at the Village Hall and is fondly remembered by the other diners. His last visit to Longhirst was to lay a wreath at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday. He will be greatly missed by his two daughters, five grandchildren and five greatgrandchildren, and by his many friends.

A celebration of Bill's life will be held at 2pm on Saturday 15 February at St. John's church and afterwards at Longhirst village hall. All are welcome to attend.

Road safety concerns

On January 6, a group of residents met with David Towns who is currently the county councillor for Longhirst.

Concerns were raised about the speed of vehicles through the village and vehicles treating some pavements as part of the road. There is a consequent, serious risk to the safety of pedestrians on footpaths and crossing the road, particularly for those who have reduced mobility, hearing or vision, as well as reports of damage to parked vehicles.

Potential actions to address this issue were discussed including a 20 mph speed limit through the village, a 40 mph buffer zone to the north of the village, speed bumps and a pedestrian crossing.

The meeting identified that an essential next step was to gather evidence by surveying residents about their experiences. This will provide a broader view of the impacts of traffic than is possible from speed surveys of the type which have been carried out in the past. The councillor also recommended that a petition to the County Council would be helpful as an indicator of support for installing traffic calming measures to ensure the safety of pedestrians and all road users in Longhirst.

Road safety concerns were discussed further at the Parish Council meeting on 9 Jan where it was suggested that a survey and petition is sent to residents.

The survey will be distributed by email with copies available on paper.

Longhirst Parish Association Trustees

At its first Board Meeting of 2025, the Longhirst Parish Association approved the investment of the Featonby legacy in a temporary HSBC money market account for three months, to give time for the board to consider the best way to manage the funds in the long term.

The Board approved the proposal that the status of the Longhirst Parish Association be changed from an unincorporated charity to a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

Applications have already been made to Northumberland County Council for planning and listed building consent for developments. These include the replacement of the front windows with bespoke double-glazed units, built to look exactly like the existing ones; the removal of the plaster and cement rendering on the foyer walls and replacing it with ventilated timber wainscoting such as that which has been installed in the reading room; the rebuilding and securing of the slightly leaning chimney; and the resurfacing of the rear car park.

You may have been aware recently that Northumbria Water have been in attendance around the village.

This is because there was a serious blockage in the main sewer adjacent to the memorial. The blockage was caused by a ball of fat, oil and grease. The blockage caused a sewage back up past some of the houses in the village and, if left unchecked would have continued all the way up to the north end of the village.

Northumbria Water asked, in an attempt to prevent further blockages, if people could please endeavour not to put any fat oil or grease down the sink.
